CHEAM FIRST NATION CHIEF AND COUNC ORRIDOR STUDY ACTION PLAN WITH THE MINISTRY OF TRANSPORTATION & INFRASTRUCTURE

Over the years Cheam has engaged MOTI in addressing transportation and safety concerns along Highway 9 in Cheam. Here's a summary of the key milestones and actions that have taken place during this election term:

April 11, 2022:

Meeting with the Council and Honourable Rob Fleming to discuss concerns and issues related to Highway 9 and Cheam Community.

April 13, 2022: In-person meeting with Associate Deputy Minister Kevin Richter, to continue the discussion of Highway 9 challenges and potential solutions.

April 28, 2022:

Site visit to discuss safety concerns and priorities along Highway 9 with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure.

Resulted in an action plan with MOTI for short-term safety improvements near the Agassiz-Rosedale Bridge and at the intersections of Victor Drive and Ferry Road.

August 26, 2022:

Received a letter from Minister Fleming confirming the Ministry's commitment to building a positive relationship with Cheam Nation through ongoing dialogue and communication.

January 13, 2023:

Another site visit with MOTI to discuss ongoing challenges along Highway 9 and provide detailed input for the Corridor Study.

February 13, 2023: MOTI held a Cheam Community Information Session, for the corridor study on Highway 9 where information was shared, and community input was sought regarding interests and ideas for the corridor study. This was the first time MOTI engaged with Cheam Members to receive input on highway and transportation planning.

June 6, 2023:

Discussed the next steps of the corridor study and the long-term phases in planning, allowing the Council to review what MOTI heard from Cheam Members and how it will be included in the Corridor Study and long-term planning.

June 2023:

Reduced the speed limit on Highway 9 to 60 km/h, based on the results of an MOTI-conducted speed survey in Summer 2022.

September 26, 2023:


Proposed the construction of a pedestrian crossing at Highway 9 & Victor Drive and a multi-use path along Highway 9 from Victor Drive to Yale Road. Phased plan includes:

Phase 1: Pedestrian activated signal at Victor Drive and a northbound bus shelter. Phase 2: The multi-use path along Highway 9 from Victor Drive to Yale Road and a southbound bus shelter.

These actions and developments demonstrate a commitment to addressing transportation concerns, improving safety, and fostering a positive relationship between Cheam Nation and the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure.

What is a Corridor Study? A corridor study is a planning project that works to define the relationships between a roadway and its adjacent land. Corridor studies are often used to: Define levels of access and mobility. Determine transportation system needs to support surrounding land uses.

Multi-use pathways are off-street pathways that are physically separated from motor vehicle traffic and can be used by any non-motorized user. This includes people walking, cycling, and using other forms of active transportation such as skateboarding, kick scootering, and in-line skating Multi-use pathways may also be referred to as shared-use pathways, multi-use trails, and boulevard multiuse pathways.

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Cheam Land Governance Advisory Committee CALL FOR MEMBERSHIP

Cheam First Nation is seeking committed Band Members willing to join the Cheam Land Governance Advisory Committee. As Cheam is under Land Code, we require input from membership on land law development and other matters that affect our Reserve Lands. The Committee has (4) seats, plus one (1) Councilor & one (1) staff member of which the term may expire in September 2025.

Role of the Cheam Land Governance Advisory Committee

The Cheam Land Committee was established under Section 6 of the Cheam First Nation Land Code.

Committee Established

The purpose of the Committee is to:

- (a) Advise Council and the Land Governance Director on the Cheam Reserve Land administration system;
- (b) Advise Council and Cheam staff on matters respecting Cheam Reserve Lands;
- (c) Recommend to Council Laws, Council Resolutions, policies and procedures respecting Cheam;
- (d) Subject to section 10 (Dispute Resolution), hold, or help arrange, meetings of Members and other meetings to discuss issues relating to Cheam Reserve Lands and make recommendations to Council on the resolution of such issues;
- (e) Assist in the exchange of information between Members and Council regarding Cheam Reserve Land matters;
- (f) Oversee other consultations under this Land Code and providing Council with updates; and
- (g) Perform such other duties and functions as Council may direct.

Eligibility

EXTENDED TO 12TH NOVEMBER 12TH Any Eligible Voter, whether or not resident on Cheam Reserve Lands, is eligible to be appointed to the Committee.

Terms of Office and Vacancy

A member of the Committee will serve for two years or until that member:

- (a) Resigns in writing;
- (b) Becomes ineligible to be a Committee member;
- (c) Ceases to be an Eligible Voter;
- (d) Is removed by Council Resolution, including if this removal is recommended by other Members of the Committee (e.g., attending sessions under the influence), or if miss two (2) consecutive meetings without confirmation; or
- (e) Dies or becomes mentally incompetent.

Individuals who are successful will be selected by Cheam Chief and Council to fill the four (4) seats with honorariums provided for according to the Terms of Reference and approved budget.

If you are a Cheam Band Member 18 years of age or older and interested in this opportunity, you are encouraged to submit a letter expressing your knowledge, experience and interest and any information that may help with selection. 

Canoe Journey and Coastal Jam Event Saturday, October 21, 2023

The Canoe Journey will launch from Cheam Fishing Village and Campground at about 9:30 am, after a press conference and ceremony. We will arrive at Shxwhá:y Village at about 11:30 am for lunch, ceremony, and another opportunity to meet the press. Around 1:30 pm, we will leave Shxwhá:y Village and paddle on to Matsqui Trail Regional Park in Mission, arriving at about 4:30 pm. A ground crew will then take the participants to Matsqui First Nation Community Centre for a Coastal Jam to celebrate our collective commitment and action to restore, preserve and conserve critical habitats for endangered salmon, sturgeon, eulachons and other fish species.

The Canoe Journey and Coastal Jam Event brings together communities and cultures, providing an influx of fresh ideas, concepts, spiritual practices, science, engineering, and a driving force to do what is necessary to restore healthy wetlands and river side channels. "There is increasing public awareness about the alarming reduction in fish habitats, and federal, provincial and municipal government officials need to pay attention to this and put much higher priority on the protection of wild salmon and its habitat," said Eddie Gardner, President of WSDA.

Wetlands and river side channels are beneficial for the mental, emotional and spiritual well-being of people, and facilitate many recreational opportunities for amateur birders, photographers and casual park users, with abundant waterfowl, frogs, and a variety of other wildlife. Many types of jobs are also related to the restoration, preservation and protection of wetlands, such as fish biologists, land guardians, Indigenous knowledge holders, hydrologists, ecotourism entrepreneurs and others. They significantly support the wild salmon economy and the inherent right of Indigenous people to a salmon fishery.

Healthy wetlands and river side channels are among Earth's more productive ecosystems, supporting an incredible amount of biodiversity. They are considered a nature-based solution to climate change – change that we are now feeling with devastating fire seasons, destructive floods, droughts and tornadoes. Conservation and enhancement of wetlands and river side channels will go a long way to ensure that we give endangered salmon a chance to survive. We deeply appreciate the investments that federal/provincial governments are now making towards fish and fish habitat, yet much more needs to be done.

Further industrial destruction of salmon habitats would result in pushing this keystone species further into extinction. This can and must be prevented. WSDA is in solidarity with the West Creek Awareness Group in its effort to stop Beedie Corporation's plans to pave over and build on West Creek Wetlands. We support the efforts of Pelolxw Tribe and their allies in restoring the Hope Slough, the Gill Bar area and the wing dike on Island 22.

The Province of BC is currently reviewing how provincial legislation can be brought into compliance with UNDRIP. The *Water Sustainability Act* and the *Local Government Act* need reviewing to align them with the commitments made in the Province's *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act Action Plan, 2022-2077,* and UNDRIP principles. Such efforts will likely result in greater protection for lands and waters in the Lower Fraser watershed, including West Creek headwaters.





Toxic Drug Response & Priority Populations Overdose Outreach Team

What's Happening?

The Fraser Health (FH) Overdose Outreach Team (OOT) works in allyship with individuals accessing the unregulated toxic drug supply to reduce the risk of toxic drug poisoning. OOT works with individuals to enhance wellness, personal resilience, self-determination and build knowledge to support safer navigation of or separation from the increasingly toxic drug supply.

OOT acknowledges not everyone who uses substances or experiences a toxic drug-poisoning event has a substance use disorder that requires clinical substance use services.

When Will This Happen?

OOT is currently taking referrals. Please see below for referral process.

Important Things To Know About OOT?

- Individuals are not required to alter their substance use to access OOT services.
- OOT is a multidisciplinary team comprised of peer support workers, outreach, and nurses working alongside social workers and consulting with harm reduction coordinators.
- Target population: Anyone > 19 yrs., accessing the unregulated toxic drug supply and are at risk of toxic drug poisoning.
- Referrals: Anyone can refer to OOT and clients can self refer. Client consent for referral is required.

For Fraser Health sites that use PARIS:

Please refer by completing and submitting a referral through the 'Substance Use Referral Form' on PARIS. Select the OOT team for the region you are making the referral to, which is determined by the client's address (i.e. if you are making a referral for Fraser East, please select *PH Overdose Outreach Team East*).



First Nations Health Benefit Program

The First Nations Health Benefit (FNHB) Program covers specific medically necessary items, services, and travel that support First Nations peoples' health and wellness needs. The program is administered through partnerships with Pacific Blue Cross and PharmaCare.

Eligibility

The FNHB Program is available to First Nations people with Indian status who live in BC and infants (up to 24 months) of an eligible parent. To access the benefits and coverage under the Health Benefits Program, First Nations people must first enroll in the program. Please call 1-855-550-5454 or visit **fnha.ca/benefits/eligibility** for more information on how to enroll.

Health Benefits Coverage

The FNHB Program covers six benefit areas:



DENTAL

The Dental benefit provides coverage for items and services to maintain good oral health, prevent cavities, gum disease, and restore damaged tooth function. Some items and services covered under the dental benefit are bridges, crowns, exams and x-rays, fillings, and preventive services.



MEDICAL SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT

The Medical Supplies and Equipment (MS&E) benefit provides coverage for items and services needed in the short or long-term to support health and wellness. Some items and services covered under the MS&E benefit are bathing and toileting aids, hearing aids and repairs, limb and body orthotics, ostomy supplies, walking aids, and wheel-chairs.



MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION

The Medical Transportation (MT) benefit assists with the cost of meals, accommodation, and transportation towards travel for a medical appointment outside your community of residence. The MT benefit may also cover travel escorts under certain conditions.

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MENTAL HEALTH

The Mental Health benefit covers in-person and virtual counselling services from a qualified mental health provider registered with the FNHB. Coverage is available for Mental Health counselling from four programs. The Mental Wellness and Counselling program is for Status First Nations individuals, while the Indian Day Schools Health Support Program, Indian Residential School Resolution Health Support Program, and Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Health Support Services are available to both status and non-status individuals. Talk to your Mental Health Provider to determine the appropriate program for you.



PHARMACY

The Pharmacy benefit, administered mainly through Plan Wellness (Plan W), provides coverage for medications and items that support First Nations people on their wellness journeys. The Pharmacy benefit covers specific prescription drugs, over-the-counter drugs, non-drug over-the-counter items, and Shingrix® vaccine. Please call 1-855-550-5454 to enroll in Plan W.

In addition to Plan W, the provincial agencies, including the BC Cancer Agency, BC Transplant, BC Renal Agency, and the BC Centre for Excellence in HIV/AIDS, provide specialty pharmacy items to all BC residents living with specific illnesses or conditions.

VISION CARE

The Vision Care benefit provides coverage for items and services to ensure proper eye health and support access to preventative care. The benefit covers eye exams, sight tests, prescription eyewear and repairs.

OTHER COVERAGE

BC Medical Services Plan (MSP)

The FNHB manages MSP for First Nations people in BC. If you have status and need to register for MSP, call 1-855-550-5454.

Ambulance Bills

The FNHB covers the cost of ambulance transport to a hospital in an emergency situation and from a lower level care facility to a higher level care facility (e.g., long-term care home to a hospital).
